FROM THE BIBLE

2 Corinthians 8:1-7

And now, brothers and sisters, we want you to know about the grace that God has given the Macedonian churches. In the midst of a very severe trial, their overflowing joy and their extreme poverty welled up in rich generosity. For I testify that they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability. Entirely on their own, they urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the Lord's people. And they exceeded our expectations: They gave themselves first of all to the Lord, and then by the will of God also to us. So we urged Titus, just as he had earlier made a beginning, to bring also to completion this act of grace on your part. But since you excel in everything —in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in the love we have kindled in you—see that you also excel in this grace of giving.

DEVOTION

We give all the time. We give attention to things and people that are important to us. We give time to school, family, jobs and hobbies. Times we give a lot and sometimes we just give a little bit. Giving generously means that we aren't selfish with the things that we're sharing. It means to give freely.

The scripture is a letter that Paul is writing to a city called Corinth. The people who lived there were called Corinthian's. Paul is telling the Corinthians about a community in a city called Macedonia that gave to them and helped them. The Macedonians were excited to give even though they were having hard times, because they knew it was what God wanted. Paul says that they gave as much as they were able and some even gave more than they were able. More importantly, this community gave themselves to God.

To give yourself to God means that you are willing to listen and obey whatever is in his plan for you and your life. When we give ourselves to God, then we are able to give freely to do the work God asks us to do. The call to give generously isn't just to the wealthy or people who have a lot of things. Everyone has something to give. If you like to cook or bake, you can give food to friends or family or anyone who needs it. If you like art, you can give pictures and crafts. In free time, you can spend it with a sibling or a grandparent or someone who just needs a friend.

The important thing to remember is that whatever you give, make sure you give it freely. When we give out of a pure heart and we give generously, God is pleased. In the last verse, Paul says that the Corinthians were really good at a lot of things and that they were smart and loving. The next step for them and for us is to be a really excellent at giving freely.

Week Three

FROM THE BIBLE

Luke 21:1-4

"He looked up and saw rich people putting their gifts into the treasury; he also saw a poor widow put in two small copper coins. He said, "Truly I tell you, this poor widow has put in more than all of them; or all of them have contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty has put in all she had to live on."

DEVOTION

This passage shows that giving is not about how much you give, but it is instead about giving all.

The woman in this story is only able to give two copper coins compared to many others giving a surplus of gifts. Despite the smaller amount given by the woman, Jesus declares she has given the most of all because she gave all she could. The message here is that truly giving all, is about giving yourself fully. There are many things that we let get in the way of giving all; we like our stuff, we like the position our wealth provides, or maybe we do not have much to give in the first place. Yet we are still called to give all, how can we do that?

Remember that God does not see us as walking dollar signs, God loves us and cares for us and provides for us even when we feel we are alone. The mindset of giving should not be focused on a certain amount, but instead on glorifying and praising God. We must give in ways that allow for the continued growth of ministries that spread God's love and support.

If you feel you do not have the means of giving monetarily, remember you have been blessed with many gifts you can share. If you love to bake find a way to give all with your baking, if you are an awesome artist find ways to praise through your art, if you have some free time work with your church or other ministries to find opportunities to volunteer. Giving all is not about giving all of your money, it is about giving of yourself.

PRAJER

Dear Lord, thank you for all of the blessings you have given, and thank you for the opportunities to give to others. Please help me to find ways that I can give all, help me to see where I can donate, where I can volunteer, and where I can direct my prayers. Amen.

FROM THE BIBLE

1 Timothy 6:17-19 (NASB)

"Instruct those who are rich in this present world not to be conceited or to fix their hope on the uncertainty of riches, but on God, who richly supplies us with all things to enjoy. Instruct them to do good, to be rich in good works, to be generous and ready to share, storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of that which is life indeed."

DEVOTION

During the season of Lent, we learn a lot about giving and loving others. By sharing our worldly possessions and riches, we mimic the great gift that God gave us when He sacrificed His Son on our behalf. When we give up things for Lent, it can be easy to go through the motions because we feel like we have to, or we feel like it's the right thing to do. The Beatitudes

He said:

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted. Blessed are the meek,

DEVOTION

In this reading, Jesus is preaching a sermon on the mountainside. This sermon is widely known as The Beatitudes. To understand our theme of who is blessed, let's look into the definition of Beatitude. Beatitude is defined as supreme blessedness. Wow. Can you imagine how loved and cherished one is to have supreme blessedness?

Further down in our reading, we find Jesus speaking more about who is blessed and why. 2 Corinthians 9:6-7

"Remember this: Whoever sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and whoever sows generously will also reap generously. Each of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver."

DEVOTION

Easter Sunday

FROM THE BIBLE

Matthew 19:16-30

Just then a man came up to Jesus and asked, "Teacher, what good thing must I do to get eternal life?"

"Why do you ask me about what is good?" Jesus replied. "There is only One who is good. If you want to enter life, keep the commandments."

"Which ones?" he inquired.

Jesus replied, "You shall not murder, you shall not commit adultery, you shall not steal, you shall not give false testimony, honor your father and mother,' and 'love your neighbor as yourself."

"All these I have kept," the young man said. "What do I still lack?"

Jesus answered, "If you want to be perfect, go, sell your possessions and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me."

When the young man heard this, he went away sad, because he had great wealth.

Then Jesus said to his disciples, "Truly I tell you, it is hard for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of heaven. Again I tell you, it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for someone who is rich to enter the kingdom of God."

When the disciples heard this, they were greatly astonished and asked, "Who then can be saved?"

Jesus looked at them and said, "With man this is impossible, but with God all things are possible."

Peter answered him, "We have left everything to follow you! What then will there be for us?"

Jesus said to them, "Truly I tell you, at the renewal of all things, when the Son of Man sits on his glorious throne, you who have followed me will also sit on twelve thrones, judging the twelve tribes of Israel. And everyone who has left houses or brothers or sisters or father or mother or wife or children or fields for my sake will receive a hundred times as much and will inherit eternal life. But many who are first will be last, and many who are last will be first.

DEVOTION

As Christians, we long for the day when we return home and receive the promise of eternal life. As we long for that day when we no longer experience this world's worries and trials, we may forget the promise of eternal life is a two-way one. It is not something we automatically receive. We must accept it by following God and His word.

In the Bible story, Jesus tells us that it is very hard for a rich man to make it into the kingdom of Heaven. You see, we must work to be more Christ-like in our actions in order to follow Him and truly be a Christian. Jesus does not care about the wealth you have, but rather how you use it to help others.

The man Jesus told to sell his possessions to be perfect was saddened by what Jesus had said. The man did not wish to give away his wealth. Yet, to truly follow Jesus, one must realize our possessions and wealth are not important and can even hinder our spiritual relationship with God.

Now, we are not saying you have to give away all your possessions to be a good Christian. However, it is important to be aware of your possessions and wealth and make sure they are not impeding the relationship you have with Christ.

Are your worldly possessions keeping you from Christ, or are you acting as a steward to the things God has given to you? Understanding that all you have is a blessing from the Lord allows you to use those blessings as God calls you to.
